A very small group braved the cold morning to go to the Waterfront in Market Harborough for a gettogether with food and drink with good conversation which is our usual tradition in January. There is no Stroll in February.

Strolling Group 2

Our January stroll took us to Leire. The village name may derive from the old British name for the Soar river, a tributary of which has its source in the south of the village. Leire (Leyre) is mentioned in the Domesday book when the number of households was 20.

The Church of St Peter is in the middle of the village. The oldest part of the Church is the 14th century ashlar (masonry made of large square-cut stones) tower. A beautiful carved font dates from 1791. The rest of the Church was rebuilt by the Victorians in 1867-8 to replace an earlier structure. The architect was William Smith from Drummond Street, London. He added the north aisle and rebuilt the Church with granite and syanite. The four-bay arcade is layered coloured stone, the floor is encaustic tiles (encaustic is a historical painting technique where the wax is heated up to be painted with.) Alan looked at the warden's accounts for 1718 and found an interesting entry: 2d to buy a hedgehog to eat all the maggots and pests which were damaging the Church.

From the Church we strolled around the village and many interesting buildings were pointed out to us and we were told about their history. We then travelled to Ashby Parva for a most welcome lunch and a chance to warm up as it was a jolly cold day!

There are no strolls for either group in February as we are on holiday but we will be back in in March when you will be able to sign up at the usual table for that month's stroll.

Meeting Point For Lifts:- Lutterworth Recreation Ground car park at 09.15am to leave at 09.20am.

<u>Start Point and Time</u>:- The Green Man, Daventry Road, Dunchurch (CV22 6NS). Start of walk 10:00am. Toilets may not be available at the start.

<u>Directions to start</u>:- Take the A426 south, out of Lutterworth. Continue on the A426 through Rugby, and then on to Dunchurch. At the traffic lights by the Dun Cow, take the turn left slip and the Green Man is immediately on your right. Entrance to the car park is to the left of the pub. Please note the "one way system" in the car park. Distance 10 miles.

<u>Art Appreciation – Co-ordinators Rae Flowerday and Sue Woodhead</u>

The painter and graphic printer William Hogarth (1697-1764), is considered a pioneer of modern caricature. Satirical, critical, talented Hogarth was one of the most popular artists in England and even today, when many Brits. think of London life in 18C. his satirical images, especially "The Rakes Progress" (1735) come to mind. His first copper-plated engraving of moralistic paintings "A Harlots Progress" (1732), was to give him great financial success. This success also led to the circulation of countless un-authorised copies, against which the artist took action in 1735 by bringing about a copywrite law. This law still bears his name called The Hogarth Act. From 1735 to 1755 he ran an academy in St Martins Lane, which became the forerunner to the Royal Academy.

After coffee, we delved into an in-depth account of "The Harlots Progress". The article points out, how Hogarth, in a satirical way, shows us the moral and social abuses of the working woman and her descent into wicked nightlife. Hogarth also shows us the decay of morality, among the upper classes.

MINUTES OF LUTTERWORTH U3A ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING TUESDAY 14 MARCH 2023

Held at The Wycliffe Rooms, George Street, Lutterworth, commencing at 10.15am

- 1. **Welcome:** A warm welcome and thanks for attendance (99 people) was extended to all present by the Chairman, Brian Poulter.
- 2. **Notices:** Tony Hirons from the new Lutterworth Museum is to speak after the AGM. New members were welcomed and Brian Poulter encouraged them and all members to join groups and take part in running Lutterworth u3a. Linda Patton thanked all the Group leaders and gave the usual notices on activities. She explained that a new Programme Secretary and Newsletter Editor were needed. In the meantime, Linda Patton is collecting reports from groups, and if there is no newsletter, the information will be on the website. Linda Patton also reminded members of the lunch on 28 March to celebrate our u3a's 20th Anniversary.
- 3. **Apologies:** June Clayton, Carmel Kerslake, Gwenda and John Lee, Peter Sneath, Liz Ayre (Hon. Treasurer), Terence Collins, Jackie Barratt and Colin Tegg.
- 4. **Minutes of the 2022 AGM:** Minutes of the 2022 AGM had been distributed along with the agenda and financial papers in the February Newsletter. There were no comments. It was proposed by Roy Maiden, seconded by Brian Fowler and accepted by the meeting that the minutes were a true and correct record.
- 5. **Chairman's Report**: A full copy of the report is attached to the file copy of the minutes. The Chairman's report covered 2022. There were many very active groups, garden and theatre trips were well supported, and the trip to Crich Tramway Museum was well organised and supported. The picnic on the lawns at Liz and David White's home was held in glorious sunshine and they have agreed for us to use their lawn again this year. A big thank you to all who made these events so successful. The membership for 2022 was 285. The membership fees pay for our costs including the hire of the Wycliffe Rooms, the speakers and newsletter printing. Costs are increasing with speakers charging more for travel and the printers have already indicated that there will be an increase soon. We need more members please.

Our website went down at the end of 2022 due to the host and much information has been lost. Roy Maiden has accepted the task of getting a new site up and running. The Committee has met every three months.

Sadly, we lost Margaret Foster a few weeks ago, known mainly for her efforts booking speakers. She will be missed by us and Bitteswell village. May she rest in peace.

A special thanks was given to Carmel Kerslake, our Newsletter Editor. Despite being seriously ill, she got the Newsletters out, but cannot continue. We send our love. A new Editor is urgently needed. A special "well done" to Liz Ayre for taking on the Treasurer's role. Many thanks to Linda Patton for all her time and effort.

Thanks also to those stepping down – Gwen Pool after six years on the Committee and most recently as Secretary, Barbara Maiden for her work as Webmaster and Peter Sneath for being on the Committee for several years.

The u3a Trust's AGM was attended by Linda Patton and Brian Poulter and, after four hours, no decision was made on the Capitation Fee, which remains the same at £4.

6. **Treasurer's Report and Presentation of Accounts:** Printed copies of the audited accounts were available at the February monthly meeting for members to take away for perusal. Any member not able to collect a printed copy was advised to contact the Membership Secretary via the link on the Membership page, requesting for it to be sent to them by email. The accounts have been signed off as a true statement of the accounts by Independent Examiner, Joy King. A copy is attached to the file copy of the minutes.

The report from Liz Ayre asked members to please make annual payments by BACS if possible as there is no longer a bank in Lutterworth. The year started with a strong balance, but prices have increased on nearly everything and we will need to increase the subscription fee by £1 to £16. This will give £4 to the Third Age Trust and £12 to Lutterworth u3a.

Pauline Elliott proposed an amendment that the increase in the subscription fee should be £2 to give £13 to Lutterworth u3a in view of the rising costs. This was seconded by Nohline Ruff and voted on by the members. 84 were in favour, so the amendment was carried and the total fee is £17 for 2023-2024.

Following a question from Penny Walker-Barber, the Chairman clarified that anyone who is a member of more than one u3a only pays one capitation fee of £4 to the Third Age Trust. Each u3a sets its own membership fee in addition to this, and this varies.

It was proposed by Sue Sharp and seconded by David White that the accounts be approved and all were in favour.
