## John Franks

Once upon a time we had a member called John Franks. He was a truly respected and loved by all with whom he came into contact, except perhaps the criminals he arrested!

John served in the Special Boat Service around the World and, when Paddy Ashdown died, he and his wife Dee were invited to his Memorial Service. After retiring from the Armed Services, he joined Leicestershire Police force and was part of the team responsible for catching the first murderer through DNA.

John was a member of the British Legion in Lutterworth. He and Dee worked with Brenda and Dave Lincoln to provide wounded servicemen with quilts and met Prince Charles and Camilla several times as a result. John was also a governor of Lutterworth High School and helped on Sports Days. In short, he devoted his life to keeping others safe and happy and the World will be a sadder place without him in it.

He died on September 2nd; Leicestershire Police will be remembering him with a plaque, he will be honoured with a bugler playing at his funeral due to his service and, although, as a result of dementia John was not able to come to Lutterworth u3a for the last few years, and many of you will never have met him, I should like you to think about him and welcome his wife back when she is able to return to us in due course. **Linda**

### Reading Group - Co-ordinator Joyce Cairney

At our September meeting we discussed "Act of Oblivion" by Robert Harris. We had not heard of this act which was passed after the return of the monarchy in 1660 and was a general pardon for everyone who had committed crimes during the English Civil War and subsequent Commonwealth period. It did not include some very serious crimes like murder and specifically did not include pardons for those involved in the regicide of King Charles I.

The book tells the story of the Civil War and period when England was ruled by Cromwell through the story written by one of those very close to Cromwell whilst he was in hiding together with his son-in-law in New England from an individual intent on catching the regicides at all costs. Robert Harris has certainly done his research in this book and all of the characters apart from hunter are real people. Of course, Harris's book is a work of fiction and he can only imagine the hardships suffered by those who fled and the families they left behind but it certainly led to a great deal of discussion amongst the group

At our October meeting we shall have discussed "The Gathering" by Ann Enright but our choices for October and November are "The Marriage Portrait" by Maggie O'Farrell who wrote "Hamnet" which we

enjoyed and "Demon Copperhead" by Barbara Kingsolver which has won awards and is loosely based on Dickens' "David Copperfield". Both books sound very interesting and if you would like to join us to discuss them, you will be very welcome. **Linda** 

#### <u>History Group – Co-ordinator Linda Patton</u>

At our September meeting we discussed ways in which the poor and destitute in England had been able to find help over the centuries. Barbara had researched this from the times when the only help could be sought from the church up until the beginning of the National Health Service in 1948. Henry VIII's abolition of the monasteries put paid to help from the church but alms houses were built to house those most in need and voluntary groups also did their best.

From the late Middle Ages, the governing classes accepted the need for legislation setting out the rules and responsibilities with a government-mandated system. Local parishes, each responsible for around 600 people, had an unpaid overseer who was answerable to those who paid the rates, a tax levied on property in proportion to the value of it, appointed to dispense the aid. The 1662 Settlement Act clarified which individuals were entitled to poor relief in the parishes to which they had a connection through birth, marriage, apprenticeship or inheritance. We heard how other legislation followed until finally the National Health Service was born.

We spent a most enjoyable an enlightening afternoon with many members having interesting facts to report.

At our October meeting we shall have a speaker, Tony Bailey, who wrote a book called "Lutterworth in Wartime". The title of his talk to us will be "Civil Defence in Lutterworth during World War II". He has a great interest in the SOE and French Resistance and his book also covers the Women's Land Army and Evacuees so I hope that as many of us as possible will turn up to hear the talk. **Linda**

#### Poetry Group - Coordinator Elizabeth Wilson

Topic - D. H. Lawrence 1885 - 1930. Snake A snake came to my water-trough On a hot, hot day, and me in my Panama's for the heat To drink there.

David Herbert is more popular for his prose than his poetry.

He was born in Eastwood, Nottingham, the fourth child in the family. He had a turbulent, unhappy childhood with quarrelling and over strict parents. He was educated in Nottingham at school and university. He married and travelled the world with his wife looking for inspiration for his writing.

He wrote about situations, and flowers, animals and scenery from an unusual angle seeing and comparing the shapes of animals in rocks or birds in the shape of trees. For example: "I go slowly as under the belly of a great black bear. Glad to emerge and look back on the yellow, pointed aspen trees laid one on another like feathers, feather over feather on the breast of the great and golden hawk"

After walking under dense pines. From a poem called "Autumn at Taos". He was very pictorial in his description. Other poems were "Bat"," Mosquito", "Snake" "Mountain Lion", "Bavarian Gentians", "Piano" and "The Ship Of Death".

His health was not good. He had TB which he denied but was very aware of death. He wrote many sad, despairing, and melancholy poetry in his later years and he died in1930 of the TB he previously ignored.

There are many interesting objects to see. For instance, the font, which is 1,000 years old, the really old wooden pews, some of which were "posher" than others as they had been bought by the local wealthy villagers. The ornate pews at the front were for the Lord of the Manor and his family. Exceptional wall paintings of The Passion were uncovered in 1929 during some repair work. Also, there is a rare Jacobean triple decker pulpit and a rood screen which is beautifully carved. Several wall monuments can be seen in the chancel which are dedicated to people in the area.

We were also treated to an in depth talk by Alan on the Catesby family who inhabited the manor from the 1300s to 1611 – their history and their famous involvement in the Gunpowder Plot.

Meeting Point For Lifts:- Lutterworth Recreation Ground car park at 09.15am to leave at 09.25am. Start Point and Time:- The Chequers, High Street, Swinford (LE17 6BL). Toilets available. Directions to start:- :- Take the A426 road south out of Lutterworth, over the "aircraft" island and on to the Gibbet Roundabout. Take first left, through Shawell and on to Swinford. Turn right at the T-junction, then right at next T-junction into High Street. The Chequers is on your left. There is very limited parking in the pub car park, but ample street parking in Stanford Road (left after the pub). Distance to walk:- 6 miles.
