## **Topical Discussion Group - Co-ordinator: Richard Whittington**

### Topic 1 Where and how to propose, or any other significant event between two people.

This question was prompted by an article on the radio where a young man had proposed to his girlfriend on the graduation stage during the ceremony. On the radio there was a varied response, however the group was very definitely of the opinion that such a proposal was inappropriate. The question could have been asked in a more private setting. How could she say no, what happens if she should change her mind afterwards. Had there been a discussion beforehand?

### Topic 2 Is our justice system fit for all of us?

This item was chosen because of the recent judgment freeing a man after a rape conviction when he was innocent and had served 17 years in prison.

This topic raised many questions. How was the compensation decided? The injustice of charging for board and lodgings for an innocent man, which thankfully has now been reversed. How can such an injustice go through the appeals system which failed to recognise the importance of the current DNA evidence and the flawed investigation originally carried out by the police? It seems that justice in our country can take an awfully long time to reach a decision e.g., claims for haemophiliac patients and their compensation for contaminated blood transfusions, the injustice of the post office officials who were prosecuted or even imprisoned for inaccurate accounting systems. Who finishes up paying for these compensations? Us or the companies involved and the CEOs who should have been held responsible.

### Topic 3 ULEZ- good or bad?

There will soon be a charge for more people entering London of £12.50, for small business this will be a considerable expense if they must make many journeys into the city.

Have the pollution controls made any difference to the air quality in the capital? The evidence varies from a 20% reduction to a marginal reduction, and it is quite different depending on the pollutant. The number of vehicles entering London has decreased. When compared to USA and China we produce very little carbon dioxide. Should we stop buying products from the USA and China?

Should ULEZ be used in more towns and cities? The next meeting will be on September 13<sup>th</sup>.
